Survey Process



Survey Process (1)

- This survey was conducted according to the Market Research Society Code of Conduct by Nether Alderley Looking Forward (NALF), a volunteer group of local residents set-up at the invitation of Nether Alderley Parish Council (NAPC).
- The survey was split into two parts, one for all adults and one for children aged
 7-17 years within Nether Alderley. Eligible postcodes were provided by NAPC.
- The content of the questionnaires incorporated inputs from the preliminary focus group discussions organised by NAPC and a series of subsequent one to one interviews conducted with stakeholders. Questionnaire design and was approved by NAPC and Cheshire East Council (CEC). It was printed by CEC.
- Questionnaires were hand delivered to all eligible households by a team of volunteers during January & February 2013 for self-completion by respondents and collected, or returned to the volunteers at the discretion of respondents, within 2-4 weeks of delivery.



Survey Process (2)

- The distribution and collection of questionnaires was completed before the announcement that AstraZeneca planned to vacate Alderley Park.
- The survey was conducted anonymously, but incentives were offered for completion for those willing to reveal their identities or make themselves available for any supplementary survey.
- From a total estimated* population of 640 residents / 220 households 279 questionnaires were returned. (Completion rate of 44% - a robust sample size for a community survey.
 - 243 adults
 - 36 children
- The survey data has been data entered into a SNAP database. Unless stated otherwise, percentages represent only those answering each question.
 Respondents were not compelled to answer each question.

Key Messages (1)

• Respondent Profile

Predominantly:

- 'Older' generation (86% 45+years)
- Post-family (78% without children at home)
- Living in mainly two person households (71% of respondents)
- High internet access (90%)

Respondents' Outlook

- Almost universally happy with life in Nether Alderley (98%)
- On balance, perception is that life has improved over last 2-3 years

Character of Neighbourhood

- Dispersed, semi-rural, almost wholly dependent on the car for most needs
- 90% require car to visit the Post Office
- 69% (of parents) take primary children to school by car



Key Messages (2)

Regional Impact

- Parish wholly dependent on neighbouring centres for local services
- Mainly supported by Alderley Edge, but being geographically dispersed, the parish looks in all directions.
 - 53% use Alderley Edge Post Office
 - 34% use Chelford Post Office
 - 8% Wilmslow
- Wilmslow attracts majority of grocery shoppers just.
 - Wilmslow 31%
 - Alderley Edge 26%
 - Handforth 18%
- Macclesfield does not feature significantly except for rail users, where it attracts 40% of the 75% who are inter-city users (60% use Wilmslow train station).



Key Messages (3)

- What do Nether Alderley Residents Value?
- Planning
 - Overwhelming appeal of their rural surroundings (92%)
 - Peace and quiet (56%)
 - Privacy and low density dwellings (54%)
 - Solid opposition to commercial development and new housing
 - 53% oppose commercial development in the Green Belt irrespective of merit
 - Dobbies' planning proposal has raised anxiety and galvanised opinion
 - 73% think the replacement of large old houses with high density housing should not be allowed
 - 79% want no significant new housing development in the parish
 - 92% advocate limiting development to brown-field and in-filling sites only
- Safety & Security
 - N A is considered a safe place to live (82%). 27% are already in a Neighbourhood Watch scheme and 63% of the rest are interested in joining



Key Messages (4)

• Public Services: Satisfaction Ratings

- Two areas stand out for particular praise:
 - Local GP services (78% satisfied)
 - CE's Waste & recycling service (76% satisfied)
- High level of criticism for:
 - Road maintenance and repair (67% dissatisfied)
 - Path & verge cleaning, including litter collection (56% dissatisfied)
 - Road cleaning (35% dissatisfied)
- Public Utilities provide mixed satisfaction ratings:
 - Most universal criticism is levelled at broadband provision (48% dissatisfied)
 - Significant dissatisfaction with Electricity (frequent power cuts) and Water (leaks)
- Experience of bus, fire and police services is limited.
 - None attract significant levels of criticism



Key Messages (5)

• Traffic

- The bypass is lauded and criticised in equal measure with the open question section of the survey
 - Praise for relieving traffic on the main route through the parish and for reducing noise
 - Criticism for spoiling the landscape, by creating noise and light pollution for those near it, and for the Council for delaying compensation for those impacted
- There are serious concerns about a number of road safety issues:
 - No footpath along Bollington Lane where bypass traffic now speeds (legally up to 60mph) and overtakes
 - Driving too fast for the conditions on Sand Lane, Welsh Row, Nursery Lane and Artists Lane (currently legal up to 60mph)
 - Speed enforcement is an issue opposite the school and around the Mill / Church junction in the conservation area on Congleton Road where the current speed limit is also considered by many to be too high.



Key Messages (6)

Social Life

- A significant minority feel there are insufficient opportunities for mixing (20%).
- 45% say they would be interested in more activities if they were available.
- Analysis of the 'wants' suggests that the primary problem could be a lack of communication about what is already available.
- Principal current activities include walking (47%), cycling (21%) and for some keep fit or pilates (20%).
- The most 'wants' are for a book group and a pub.
- Of the options suggested by the National Trust the natural play area attracted the most support (31%).
- 37% have used a CE library in the last 6 months and 8% claim access to a library is a problem for them.



Key Messages (7)

Communications

- There is a large gap in communications regarding information and news in the neighbourhood. It is probably the largest and easiest issue to solve.
- A large minority (37%) do not regularly read any local newspaper (either paid or free), see AlderleyEdge.com or receive the church magazine.
- The most read are:
 - Wilmslow Express 37%
 - St Mary's Church Magazine 35%
 - AlderleyEdge.com 30%
- High lack of awareness of the Parish Council
 - Just under half don't have all the information they would like about the work of the parish council (44%) or know how to make contact (42%)
 - 30% don't know where to find a Parish Council notice board.
 - 50% now know about the website (awareness created by the survey?)



Key Messages (8)

Children

- Most children enjoy the rural benefits of living in NA, especially those interested in country sports such as horse riding.
- But, there are several disadvantages:
 - No playground, playing field or anywhere for children to socialise.
 - Mainly dependent on parental transport for their social lives
 - Relatively low child population (so not very social)
- Few walk to school. Most are either driven to school by their parents or by bus.
 They are mainly dependent on similar transport for their social activities.
- There was widespread enthusiasm for the National Trust's proposals for a natural play area, mountain biking and permissive horse-rider routes.
- Amongst the 7-12 year group support for a playground is 100%.



Recommendations



Recommendations (1)

- Planning:

• Confirmation of commitment from CE to stand firm on preservation of the Green Belt and planning approvals regarding commercial and housing development.

– Road Safety:

- 30mph speed restrictions on Welsh Row, Sand Lane, Artists Lane, Nursery Lane and Congleton Road by the school and around the National Trust Mill and Church junction in the conservation area.
- Install path along Bollington Lane now an official route onto the bypass.
- Move the existing speed camera to a position adjacent to the school.
- Install pelican crossing or other feature to enable children to cross Congleton Road in safety.
- Provide facility for safe pedestrian crossing at Monks Heath junction (e.g. Red / Green man option on traffic signals)

- Safety & Security:

• Encourage and facilitate local police promotion of Neighbourhood / Rural Watch scheme and provide appropriate facilities to meet perceived need and foster community spirit.



Recommendations (2)

Infrastructure

• Address issues holding up delivery of fast fibre optic broadband to the village.

- Maintenance & Appearance:

- Explore the concept of re-establishing 'Lengthsmen' (on volunteer basis if necessary) to monitor potholes, maintenance and cleaning issues, liaising with CEC departments and marshalling volunteers as necessary for tasks including litter-picking etc.
- Establish regular maintenance regime for clearing paths, drains and ditches and trimming verges and hedges with CEC (contacting private individuals where it is their responsibility), including cleaning of signs.
- Restore damaged speed restriction sign at entrance to the conservation area.
- Explore prospect of introduction of measures to encourage horse owners to clean up 'droppings' from pavements.
- Investigate potential for reducing frequency of power cuts.



Recommendations (3)

– Communications:

- Encourage NAPC to publish more details of their activities on their website and to explore the possibility of an online newsletter or investigate potential for greater liaison between NAPC and AlderleyEdge.com as happens with Alderley Edge Parish Council.
- Refurbish and improve the quality and content of NAPC notice boards, including the provision of an extra board where it might be seen by more residents (near the postbox by the Market Cross perhaps).
- Explore the possibility of creating a 'Community' website and notice board for anything other than parish council notices with a co-ordinator liaising with the church and other local organisations such as Friends of St Mary's to publicise information about the facilities, activities and current events undertaken or planned in the village.



Recommendations (4)

– Beautification:

- Install 'Welcome to Nether Alderley Please drive carefully through the village' signage and signs informing visitors about the key sites in the village.
- Directions to parking places.
- Secure agreement for the planting spring bulbs and seek volunteers for the task.
- Restore Cheshire railings. Explore availability of grants, use of volunteers and response of landowners.
- Explore possibility of restoration of market cross (ancient monument issues as well as funding such as grants or sponsorship).

– Recreation:

• Support the National Trust's proposed initiatives and explore opportunity for a playground.






Q2. Which do you consider to be the THREE best things about Nether Alderley?


Q2. Which do you consider to be the THREE best things about Nether Alderley?







Q2. Which do you consider to be the THREE best things about Nether Alderley?






Q3-10. How satisfied are you with each of the following local public services provided by Cheshire East Council?






Q3. How satisfied are you with the <u>Waste & Recycling</u> service provided by Cheshire East Council?


Q4. How satisfied are you with the Road & Maintenance Repair service provided by




Q5. How satisfied are you with the <u>Road Cleaning</u> service provided by Cheshire East Council?






Q6. How satisfied are you with the <u>Path & Verge Cleaning</u> service provided by Cheshire East Council?
















Q11. How satisfied are you with the Local Bus service?








Q13. How satisfied are you with the local Fire Service?






Q14. How satisfied are you with the local <u>Health Service (GP)</u>?






Q15. How satisfied are you with the local Water supplier?






Q16. How satisfied are you with the local Electricity supplier?






Q17. How satisfied are you with the local Mains Gas supplier?







Overall Perception: Trend


Q20. Taking everything into consideration, is the way you feel about living in Nether Alderley better or worse than it was 2-3 years ago?

Respondents' Spontaneous Comments on the Neighbourhood & their Public Services


Q22. Do you have any specific comments on your satisfaction with the neighbourhood or the provision of local public services?

- Top of mind issues: Just under a third of respondents chose to comment.
- Roads:
 - Perceived lack of adequate road maintenance (pot holes), gutter, drain, ditch, verge and pavement clearing.
 - Strong mixed views on bypass: much noisier for some, less congestion, improved safety and quieter for others.
 - Traffic speed a top-of-mind issue in several specific locations.
- Utilities:
 - Frustratingly slow broadband speed
 - Frequent power cuts and water leaks
- Planning:
 - Anxiety about CE's commitment to maintaining Green Belt and the low density rural character of the locality.












Q24. Where do you find out about activities and news of Nether Alderley?






Q24. Where do you find out about activities and news of Nether Alderley? Age: Under 45 yrs






Q24. Where do you find out about activities and news of Nether Alderley? Age: 45-64 yrs






Q24. Where do you find out about activities and news of Nether Alderley?

Age: 65+ yrs






Q24. Where do you find out about activities and news of Nether Alderley? Family Status








Q29. Do you have any additional comments or suggestions regarding local news/ communications?

- General:
 - Only 12% responded implying that it's not an important issue for most.
 - The free local paper is not distributed in Nether Alderley. Expectation that the Parish Council should be more visible.
- Notice boards:
 - Notice boards could be more effective. An additional board, and more information on them could help.
- Online:
 - The Parish Council is not considered pro-active in managing communications despite having a website that most find attractive.
 - More information about local activities and the parish council's meetings could be made available online through the website and online newsletters.





Q31. The existing opportunities for meeting and mixing locally are adequate for my needs




Q32. Which, if any, of the following leisure activities do you currently enjoy/participate in, whether in NA or anywhere else? [Including additional 'Other' responses.]





















Q37. Is access to a library a problem for you?



- A refurbished parish hall would become a more attractive venue for activities.





























 - This question attracted responses from 20% of respondents amongst whom there was much consistency.
 - Lovely area in which to live: attractive historic heritage
- But, lack of maintenance gives shabby impression
 - Pot holed roads
 - Rarely cleared pavements
 - Infrequently cleared ditches and drains
 - Infrequently trimmed hedges and verges
 - Uncleaned horse poo on pavements
 - Unrepaired street furniture
 - Litter along road margins
- Noisy Bypass
 - Made worse by perceived greater use of emergency vehicle sirens



















- General:
 - 17% of respondents commented, mostly regarding road safety rather than crime.
- **Road Safety:** The main concern is traffic driving too fast for the conditions
 - Welsh Row (a residential lane with a 60mph limit)
 - Sand Lane (a residential lane and peak hours rat run with a 60mph limit)
 - Artists Lane (a very narrow lane and peak hours rat run with 60mph limit)
 - Bollington Lane (with no pavement and now a key link between the bypass, Holmes Chapel and Knutsford with a 60mph limit).
 - Nether Alderley school section of Congleton Road (limited visibility with 40mph limit)
 - Conservation stretch of Congleton Road (limited visibility with 40mph limit)



 - Resisting the re-building houses with large properties out of character with their neighbours









Q75. Which Post Office do you mainly use?






Dependence on Neighbouring Centres


- **General:** Slightly under 15% of respondents commented, mostly with consistent views.
- Inadequate Alderley Edge Parking:
 - Being a dispersed rural community, Nether Alderley residents are dependent on their cars for access to the shops and trains of Alderley Edge, but both short and long-term parking facilities are lacking.
 - The emphasis in Alderley Edge is on tight parking control over limited spaces and pricing-out to deter potential shoppers and rail travellers.
 - Hopeful rail travellers can't be sure of a parking place in either Alderley Edge or Wilmslow.




Q79. How do you usually get to your nearest local centre (e.g. Post Office)?






Q80. How often, if ever, do you use a public bus service to or from Nether Alderley?

Q82. How does your child usually get to school?







Q85. Is the lack of a pelican crossing or a crossing patrol by the school on Congleton Road a concern for you?






Respondents' Spontaneous Comments on Transport & Travel

Q86. Do you have any additional comments on local transport and travel issues?

- **General:** 14% of respondents commented. Comments reflected a wide range of specific issues. There was little consistency between the comments.
- Issues:
 - More long-term parking required at Alderley Edge and Wilmslow for rail users
 - Electronic train status board would be helpful on Alderley Edge platform
 - Tried walking to school, but children nervous of crossing the road
 - High cost of 'short hops' by bus
 - Infrequent bus service: timetable in bus shelters would be helpful
 - Difficulty in crossing Chelford Road at Monks Heath in order to catch the bus
 - Bus stop at Mill withdrawn as NT objected to bus pulling-in on their car park
 - Gatso camera by the bypass roundabout should be repositioned opposite the school
 - Dangerous speeds in narrow parish lanes




Q87. Which, if any, of the following do you support?




Q88. Is there a need for a new community hall or could refurbished parish hall facilities meet the needs of the community?

Respondents' Spontaneous Comments on Improvements for Nether Alderley

Q90. Do you have any additional comments on local transport and travel issues?

- **General:** 19% of respondents commented.
- Issues:
 - Spruce up:
 - Clear paths, drains, ditches, trim verges and hedges
 - Restore market cross, clear lake (Church Meadow) and create picnic spot
 - Restore Cheshire railings
 - Seek urgent attention to improve broadband speed
 - Improve road maintenance
 - Impose 30mph speed limits on Welsh Row, Sand lane, Nursery Lane, Artists Lane and on Congleton Road adjacent to the school and in the Conservation area between the mill and Church
 - Secure CE commitment on the Green Belt
 - Refurbish Parish Hall
 - Plant a few spring bulbs
 - Welcome to Nether Alderley, Please drive slowly' sign people might then drive more slowly through village.



Any Other Comments

Q95. Do you have any other comments on issues that you feel have not been adequately address elsewhere that you would like to fee into the Nether Alderley Parish Plan?

- General: 15% of respondents commented.
- Issues:
 - Why has the compensation for residents disadvantaged by the bypass been delayed?
 - Insist that promise of no ribbon development made during the bypass planning process is rigidly maintained. Stand firm against the building of Dobbies superstore.
 - Establish a relationship with AZ for village use of their facilities
 - Set-up litter clearing volunteer teams
 - Investigate the potential for fast fibre optic broadband cable to be run down the existing Nynex conduit
 - Construct footpath along Bollington Lane (Congleton Road to Chelford Road cut as it has become dangerous for pedestrians following completion of the bypass
 - Arrange for hedge trimming along pavement on Congleton Road
 - Investigate potential free access to Alderley Park for leisure purposes
 - Village 'welcome' and 'brown signs' directing visitors to our sites of interest. More bulbs and flowers to make the village look welcoming.
 - Achieve better communication of all the activities already happening in the parish, mainly around the church.




Q1. How do you rate Nether Alderley as a place to live?




Q4. Where do you go to school or college?








Adult Sample (243): Profile




Adult Sample (243): Profile
